

## Vicar's Letter

Autumn – full of colour, seasons of mists and mellow fruitfulness, and gathering swallows twitter in the skies, two lines from John Keats's Poem - 'Ode to Autumn'. Although global warming means that the seasons are not as predictable as in the past, still a season where nature shows her full glory.

The church at this time of year also prepares for a season of thankfulness and remembrance.

Thankfulness as the harvest is gathered in and our churches are full of glorious produce and floral displays showing the abundance of God's generosity. A time to reflect and give thanks to God, and a time, perhaps, to repent for our lack of care for the world that he has given, for our selfishness in not sharing the earth's bounty fairly and our failure to protect resources for others; But nevertheless a time of thanksgiving and doing what we can to share the resources that God provides for us.

Our Benefice Service of Commemoration and thanksgiving on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> November at 3pm at St. Andrew's, Aysgarth, allows us also to reflect and give thanks in a more local and intimate way. It allows us to remember with thanksgiving before God those whom we have known more directly; those who gave us life, who nurtured us in faith and are yet separated from us by death. Another day for both church and community to remember those who lost their lives in both World Wars and more recent conflicts such as Afghanistan, the Ukraine, the Middle East and the Sudan, is that of Remembrance Day and Remembrance Sunday this year on Sunday the 10th November.

One thing that these seasons, of both nature and remembrance have in common is a time for reflection, time to stop, take stock and to give thanks to God for all that He gives us in providing both for our physical needs and for providing friends and families who support us with their love, kindness and generosity through all life's journeys. And a time to remember that 'the Steadfast love of the Lord never ceases, his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is his faithfulness.' *Lamentations 3.22,23*

## Schools' Harvest Service at St Andrew's Church

The BAWB schools will be celebrating Harvest in a special service at **St Andrew's Church at 2.00 p.m. on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> October.** Each class will bring a contribution, and we will see a dramatic presentation of the feeding of the 5,000 – showing that Jesus can magnify the little we offer, and make it a huge blessing.

Although teaching at West Burton School has been temporarily suspended, the communities at this end of the catchment area remain very important, so it's especially good to welcome the children from all three schools – **B**ainbridge, **A**skrigg and **W**est **B**urton once again to Aysgarth church.

Recently, it has worked well to have year groups from across the three schools being taught together – so all children in years 2 and 3 had been taught at West Burton.

It became necessary to turn to this temporary suspension while Governors review the new statutory requirement that children spend 32.5 hours in class each week, alongside the time and complexity of transporting them from their registered school to their taught school.

Sue Ryding, Chair of Governors, writes: ""As soon as we have a clear understanding of the implications of those options, we will then be in a position to consult with parents and the wider community as to how our federation can go forward."

## Hymns and their Tunes Alleluia, sing to Jesus and the tune Hyfrydol

It's safe to say, I think, almost all the hymns we have examined over the last couple of years or so have been written by academic theologians, ordained clergy or poets. In similar vein virtually all the tunes have been written by professional musicians, often church organists, or composers of note.

Today's hymn and its tune were both written by non-specialists whose main occupations were in fields well away from what we might expect. William Chatterton Dix (1837-1898) who wrote the words was born into a wealthy Bristol family and whose father was a surgeon. He spent most of his life as a manager of a marine insurance company in Glasgow. He obviously had an interest in composing religious verses as his other compositions include" As with gladness, men of old" and the harvest hymn "To Thee, O Lord, our hearts we raise" but it appears to be a sideline or pastime.

His upbringing and family background contrast with those of Roland Huw Prichard (1811-1887) who wrote the tune. (One translation of "Hyfrydol" is aptly – melodious). Pritchard left his native Bala to find work first as a loom tender's assistant and later in a management role in the Welsh Flannel Manufacturing Company in Holywell, Clwyd.

He had a great interest in congregational singing and by the age of twenty had produced, in Welsh, a book of Christian songs for young singers in which Hyfrydol was one of the tunes. Welsh was his main language, and it is possible he spoke no English. I have a picture of him highly involved in and full of enthusiasm for the Welsh chapel congregational singing tradition though his burial place is in the Holywell parish churchyard.

It is highly doubtful to think that Dix and Pritchard ever met. I cannot trace an earlier coupling of words and music before the 1933 revision of the English Hymnal by Ralph Vaughan Williams. He arranged and harmonised the version we sing today. I suspect, however, that tune and words were already linked.

It is a wonderful hymn, and I remember vividly a few months ago it being the recessional hymn of the Wednesday Radio 3 Choral Evensong from St David's Cathedral. It was made extra memorable in that it was so heartily sung in Welsh. I wonder if Pritchard ever heard it as we hear it today. I somehow doubt it. *Geoff Hirst* 

## **Reflecting Faith: Window Glass**

Why do we have so much coloured glass of all shapes and sizes in church buildings? Stained glass in churches is similar to wall paintings in that it adds colour as well as traditionally serving the purpose of teaching non-literate people the great events and characters of their religion.

But glass is so much more than that.

The techniques used to create these windows have been refined over the centuries, and their intricate beauty has inspired countless artists and designers.

The way the light shines through the glass creates a unique atmosphere that is often described as ethereal or heavenly. In this way, the use of stainedglass windows helps to create a sacred space that is set apart from the secular world.

The light shining through the glass is shown onto the brickwork or stonework surrounding the glass and depending on the original colours, the intensity of the light, the angle of the sun's rays as well as the height and angle away from the watcher: these can range from vibrantly strong to softly muted.

Hundreds of years ago people saw the changes in light in this way as being very significant. It was thought that the light passing through was transformed or transmuted and because of this it had a healing and revivifying effect on people who placed themselves within its light.

If you visit a church on a sunny day enjoy the play of light being put on for you. What does it say about God's love for you? *Editor. Parish Pump*

# Where do postcodes come from?

Some 65 years ago, on 11<sup>th</sup> October 1959, Britain began introducing postcodes. They started in Norwich, and by 1974 had been rolled out across the whole country.

The idea was to speed up sorting following the mechanisation of the postal system. But for the process to work, people had to use it, and it was therefore important to make sure that people could remember their postcode easily. So, psychologists from Cambridge University were asked to assist in their design.

This worked so well that a survey in 2016 revealed that people are now more likely to remember their postcode than their debit card PIN (92%, compared with 77%). And the information sticks: apparently 17% of people questioned could still remember the postcode of the house they lived in up to 30 years earlier.

When the first postcodes were trialled in Norwich, the first three characters were NOR (now NR followed by a number) representing the name of the city, and the last three signified a particular street or large business.

Why Norwich? Because of its new sorting machines.

The main point of a postcode is to ensure that a letter or parcel gets to the correct Royal Mail sorting office, where it can then be sorted into the correct round. So the "outcode" will specify a postcode area and district, and will have up to four characters. The "incode" designates a particular postcode sector and delivery point, and always has one number and two letters.

What is a delivery point? It could be a street, part of a street or a single property. Or in rural areas, something a bit bigger. The postcode area is of course much larger: the smallest in Britain is WC in London, covering one square mile. The largest is IV, Inverness, at 6,243 square miles. *Tim Lenton/Parish Pump*
