


#### Vicar's Letter

As I write to you, we are heading towards the darkest time of the year. On December 21<sup>st</sup> the night will be more than twice as long as the day, with just seven hours and 29 minutes between sunrise and sunset in Wensleydale.

Darkness can be threatening, and it's always encouraging to think of the days lengthening with the coming of the new year!

But we use the darkness as a curtain to display an ever-increasing range of Christmas lights in this season – decorating windows, house fronts and even gardens with illuminations that cheer us and raise our spirits as our eyes are drawn to them - in contrast to the dark.

Some of our villages are once again lighting a new window each day in December, as they become living Advent calendars. Look out for numbered windows in West Witton, Thoralby or Carperby!

There's a strange saying in the midst of that wonderfully mysterious opening chapter of St John's Gospel. It's a passage we often read or listen to in our Christmas services. John writes in Chapter 1 verse 5, 'The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it'.

In the older Bibles this reads, 'And the light shineth in the darkness; and the darkness comprehended it not'.

Light disperses darkness – whereas darkness cannot subdue – or grasp the light.

There can be many reasons why we feel the world is a dark place – and not just literally because of the winter. Our lives might be filled with trouble and challenge; the news might be ever more threatening – but the celebration of Christmas, even more than being merely a time of parties and of forgetting of troubles is a time when we celebrate that Light which shines in – and overcomes the darkness.

We celebrate a message of angels ... a star in the heavens ... the birth of the world's Saviour ... a sign of God's presence.

The darkness may still be present, but just as our eyes are drawn to Christmas lights, so if we pay attention to the heart of the Christmas good news, we shall find that the darkness is lessened and hope Is awakened.

During this dark month of December, on clear nights you will see a bright light in the sky, apart from the moon.

Earth and Jupiter are both on the same side of the sun, and are in alignment, so the planet appears especially bright. Perhaps it will be a reminder of the star that led the Magi – and like our decorations serve to remind us of the birth of Jesus, the Light of the world!

The contemporary hymn writer and worship leader Graham Kendrick has written:-

Like a candle flame Flickering small in our darkness Uncreated light Shines through infant eyes ...

May the God who comes to us in Christ, banish the darkness and embrace us with his light and life this Christmas and beyond!



# **Everyone is Welcome to Attend our Church Services and Events**

Hymn books and paper copies of any words used in the service will be handed out. The person leading the service may invite you to stand, if you are able, and say some of the responses at certain parts of the service, or these instructions may be written within the service sheets. Join in with as much or as little as you like and if you're unsure just follow others' lead.

Feel free to ask the welcomer any questions you have about the service or event and they will be happy to help, or you can contact the church beforehand to find out more about the local arrangements. See contact details on the inside page of this magazine.

After some services, refreshments are offered, this could be a good opportunity to get to know people, but there is no pressure to stay if you prefer not to.

## **Hymns and their Tunes**

#### Lo, He comes with clouds descending to the tune Helmsley

It is appropriate as Advent begins to look at one of the season's most popular hymns and the contribution made to it by the best known and most prolific English hymn writer, Charles Wesley (1707-1788). Our Aysgarth hymnbook has twenty one hymns credited to him; the Methodist's "Singing the Faith" has seventy six and he is believed to have composed over six thousand.

Wesley graduated from Christ Church Oxford in 1732 and was ordained in 1735. He had been a key member of a student prayer group at Oxford but not until 1737 did he experience what was his evangelical conversion or, as he called it, "his renewal of faith".

Unlike some of his fellow "Methodists" he remained an Anglican until his death, believing, I understand, he could more effectively influence from within the then somnolent and self-satisfied Church of England. He held a brief curacy in 1739 but was made to resign because of his preaching style and its strong evangelical slant.

The provenance of the hymn, however, is not straight forward. It is pretty certain though, that the final draft and the words which we sing were Wesley's. The first version was written by John Cennick (1718-1755). His original first line was "Lo he cometh, countless trumpets." The biblical reference of the current first line of the hymn is Revelation Chapter 1 Verse 7.

The tune is ascribed to Thomas Olivers, a Welshman and Methodist preacher and a cobbler by trade. The story is that he heard the tune being whistled by an Irish labourer in London which has in fact been traced to an Irish "concert" song from Dublin. Both editions of this song which I have seen would have needed quite a bit of work to adapt to the current words. An example of not letting the devil have all the best tunes?

It found its way into John Wesley's "Select Hymns and Tunes Annext" of 1765. We can only wonder today at the power and influence of what must have been a phenomenal double act of the two brothers, John with the emphasis on preaching and Charles on congregational participation in communal worship.

What I cannot discover is why the tune takes the name of a pretty North Yorkshire market town. If anyone can cast further enlightenment on this please let me know.

This is my last contribution of hymns and their tunes. I have enjoyed sharing my own enjoyment and understanding of this very important aspect of our worship, whether as an aid to understanding aspects of the biblical basis of our faith or just for the sheer spiritual uplift so many of our favourite hymns give us. I hope it has helped you too. *Geoff Hirst*

#### The Colours of Christmas

There are several colours that we traditionally associate with Christmas. They are green, red, and gold, and to a lesser extent, white and blue.

**Green:** Evergreen plants like holly, ivy and mistletoe were used for thousands of years to decorate buildings during the long dark winters. The Romans exchanged evergreen branches in January to wish each other good luck. The ancient Egyptians brought palm branches into their home during the mid-winter festivals. In Europe during the Middle Ages, the 'Paradise tree' which figured in plays about the loss of Eden, was normally a pine tree with red apples tied to it.

**Red:** This is the colour of holly berries, and it reminded people of Jesus's blood when He died on the cross. Red is also the colour of bishops' robes, which is how St Nicholas came to be portrayed wearing red. Red is also the colour of fire, which keep you warm during cold dark nights.

**Gold:** This is the colour of the Sun and light. It was the present of one of the Wise Men, and traditionally, was the colour of the star over Bethlehem.

**White:** This is the colour of purity and peace. It is the colour of the altar cloth at Christmas.

**Blue:** This is the colour of Mary's robe. It is also the colour of the sky and heaven.
